 - 5. Charles (Madison to Oliver PM Peak Only)
 - 6. St. Paul (Franklin to Pratt)
 - 7. Gay (Baltimore to Forrest)
 - 8. Hillen (Forrest to Guilford)
 - 9. Guilford (Pleasant to Baltimore)

Discussion Summary:

- ➤ On December 5, 2016 the MTA announced BaltimoreLink v1.3 draft
- Maryland Avenue presents challenges for bus drivers who reported that it is a tight fit due to the width of the single travel lane and having parked cars on either side. Additionally, bus drivers have snow-related concerns. The MTA will be monitoring this route, and have staff working on an alternative solution if necessary.
- ➤ The MTA plans to have a final BaltimoreLink draft published by March 1, 2017 after the public hearings are finished. The targeted "go live date" is scheduled for June 18, 2017.
- Bus stop optimization will decrease the amount of curb space needed for bus stops resulting in additional parking for vehicles. The initial phase of optimization is scheduled for February 2017, with another phase included as part of the BaltimoreLink rollout in June 2017.
- > Overall, the new BaltimoreLink plan will add 80-90 stops to the bus network.
- The MTA is currently working on changing their internal "phone tree" (MTA's phone call help line) to make it simpler and faster to access a customer service representative.
- ➤ To determine how the MTA will define the success of BaltimoreLink (comparing service existing/new), staff is working on defining "service standards" and metrics.
- The MTA will be using "Street Teams" to communicate critical BaltimoreLink service change information directly to riders at locations where BaltimoreLink service changes will be occurring, including on-board buses, at bus stops, and at transit/transfer locations. The MTA encourages all transit advocates to join a "Street Team" to help spread the word.

Next Steps:

Kevin Quinn will make another presentation to the committee in early 2017 to provide an update
on the metrics and "service standards" that have been developed to measure the success of
BaltimoreLink.

Robin Budish, on behalf of Transit Choices concluded the meeting by thanking everyone for attending and acknowledged Kevin Quinn and his colleagues for their continued spirit of collaboration and cooperation. She also thanked the Baltimore Community Foundation for providing meeting space.
