Jim Brown, Manager of Trail Development with the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy <u>Presentation</u>: **"Baltimore Greenway Trails Network"**

Overview:

The Baltimore Greenway Trails Coalition seeks to create a 35-mile network of world-class urban trails. The trail will provide equitable, healthy, low-stress access to open space and reliable transportation and recreation for people of all ages and abilities.

This modern-day trail vision is inspired by the 1904 Olmsted Plan for Baltimore, which called for creating a network out of the city's parkland. Today, they have identified new opportunities in the built environment to bring this vision to reality.

Second Guest Speaker:

Arthur L. Guzzetti, Vice President - Policy, American Public Transportation Association <u>Presentation</u>: "Cashless / Wireless / Paperless / Driverless: Megatrends Affecting Transit Worldwide"

Overview:

Technology, entrepreneurship and changing customer expectations are disrupting traditional models for mobility, and are challenging the ways public transportation operators approach their business. The American Public Transportation Association is immersed into researching and writing about these changing dynamics. APTA's Vice President for Policy, Art Guzzetti, described the forces driving the sharing economy and the likely scenarios through which automated vehicles will gain prominence. Yes, calamity can indeed be a time of opportunity. Public transportation can be the backbone of emerging multi-modal lifestyles, and taking advantage of the new array of choices available to travelers. In the coming months, public transit agencies will face important, strategic decisions, each of which will need to be considered through the lens of adaptation. Mr. Guzzetti framed and discussed many of the critical questions facing public transportation agencies today, and highlighted some of the innovations underway around the country.

- Key Findings of this Initial Study
 - The more people use shared modes, the more likely they are to use transit, own fewer cars, and spend less on transportation overall.
 - "Supersharers" people who routinely use several shared modes, such as bikesharing, carsharing and ridesourcing report greater transportation savings and own half as many cars as people who use transit alone.
 - Ridesourcing services are most frequently used for social trips between 10:00 pm and 4:00 am, when transit runs less frequently or is not available.

Other Business:

- Jimmy Rouse, a Founding Member of Transit Choices acknowledged the wonderful presentations by Mr. Smith, and Mr. Guzzetti. He also thanked the meeting attendees for their participation stating that it gives the organization strength and validity. Mr. Rouse then asked Robin Budish, Director Transit Choices to provide the following update on recent activities:
 - Transit Choices has been participating in North Avenue Rising Community Advisory Panel Meetings to provide input on the \$27.3 million project to revitalize the North Avenue corridor.
 - A tour of the MTA Operations Control Center (OCC) will be held on Thursday, April 5, 2018 from 9 AM 11 AM. Following the tour, Kevin B. Quinn, Jr. (MTA Administrator, MDOT MTA) and OCC Leadership will lead a group discussion.
 - The Saving Baltimore's TIGERs social media campaign has produced successful results. Transit Choices received 175 grassroots signatures supporting federal Transportation Investments to Maryland Federal Legislators which will be hand delivered in Washington, DC on March 1, 2018.
 - Transit Choices in partnership with the Central Maryland Transportation Alliance, 1000 Friends of Maryland, Citizens Planning & Housing Association, Bikemore, Global Shapers Baltimore, and the Baltimore Transit Equity Coalition will host a **Gubernatorial Candidates Forum:** "Leadership for Improving Transportation" on <u>Thursday, May 31,</u> <u>2018</u>. The event will be held from 6:30 PM – 8:30 PM at The Real News Network, 231 N. Holliday Street – Baltimore, MD. Jayne Miller of WBALTV will serve as moderator.
 - After five successful years, Transit Choices has launched its first fundraising campaign. Contributions will help to ensure Transit Choices leadership on transit issues and its commitment to improving mobility and economic opportunity for all citizens of Baltimore City.
- Ben Cohen, Assistant Director, Workforce Transportation & Community Programs with The BWI Business Partnership, Inc. announced the following two bills from Delegate Pam Beidle: HB 1227 Tax-Credit Commuter Benefits-Alterations and HB1468 Transit-Job Access and Reverse Commute. Mr. Cohen also mentioned a new bi-monthly transportation forum in the upcoming issue of www.bizmonthly.com
- The Center for Mobility Equity, (formerly Central Maryland Regional Transit) a 501(c)3 organization founded in 1987, provides transportation information to over 300,000 people annually throughout Maryland. Their Travel Training Program empowers individuals with disabilities, students, Veterans, and older adults to explore fixed-route transportation options, understand their rights under the Americans with Disabilities Act, and more fully participate in their communities.
