


State of Biking in Baltimore Update 12/8/2017

Des Moines \$33M




Baltimore Downtown **Bike Network** \$7M

Entering 2018 with a 33 mile deficit.















Baltimore Separated **Bike Network** \$25-30M

FY18	\$70K




Complete Streets

Total Distance	+50K miles
Total Trips	+30K
Annual Members	1600
Occasional Members	10K

Bike Share Timeline

- Opened Fall 2016
- Grew to Phase I 250 Bikes by Spring 2017
- Theft and Vandalism reduced fleet Summer 2017
- Went offline for 5 weeks Fall 2017
- New lock and technology introduced Fall 2017
- Returned to Phase I Levels Dec 2017
- Now constructing new stations to achieve promised fleet of 500 bikes/ 50 stations by Spring 2018
- About 6-8 months behind schedule

Bike Share Challenges

- Funding
 - Need Corporate Sponsor
 - Brand issues
- Public Relations
- Customer Service
- Density
- Time to launch means not tracking with technology
 - Dockless is coming

Bike Share Opportunities

- When it works, people use it
- Need to grow with programming
 - It's how you restore brand and introduce new users to system
- E bike/Docking municipal run fleet still has some advantages over dockless
